

Academic Courses

The Stellenbosch University Summer School offers 3 programmes: The *General Elective Programme*, the *Doing Business in Southern Africa Programme* and the *Global Service Learning (GSL) Programme*. Students can only do one of these programmes as they run simultaneously over the span of the Summer School. These academic programmes consist of lectures, group discussions and field

trips aligned with the content covered during lectures and are taught by Stellenbosch University faculty and other South African experts.

General Elective Programme

Students following the General programme have the option to enrol for 1 – 3 courses during their period of study in Stellenbosch.

The courses cover a variety of fields of study, which includes: Philosophy, Botany, Political Science, Economics, Literature, Art and Media, History, HIV/AIDS, International Relations & Chinese Studies. All Summer School students. This course serves as contextual base for the upcoming courses and fosters understanding of South Africa political and historical

landscape to be expanded upon through other disciplines varying on the courses selected. **Students can only choose one Elective 2 course and one Elective 3 course.**

**Students following the General Elective Programme can Top Up their courses to receive (1 US/ 2ECTS credits) per course.*

Elective 1 course

19 June – 29 June 2026

Course 1: Introduction to South Africa's Political History

Field of Study Political Science and History

**Course
Description**

This course serves as an introduction to South Africa's political history, aimed at familiarising students with the historical context that shaped, and continues to shape, the country and its people. Understanding the interplay between the country's political, social and economic issues and how the colonial and apartheid past impacts on the present allows us to better comprehend the challenges currently facing South African society.

Elective 2 Courses

Course 2

Bio-Diversity: Plants for the People in the Western Cape

Field of Study Botany

**Course
Description**

The extraordinary botanical diversity of the Cape Flora and the ecological processes that helped shape it are explored. Once a basic understanding is gained through lectures and two field excursions, the course adopts a more applied focus. We explore the horticultural potential of local plants in the international cut flower industry and visit local flower farms. Finally, we explore traditional plant use by local people, especially traditional healers, through lectures and visits to healers and/or traditional medicinal markets.

Visual Narratives and South-North Interactions

Field of Study Art and Media

**Course
Description**

In this course, we will track major developments and changes in South African art, media and especially film during the Apartheid era (1948-1994) and after (1994-present). The point of this broad historical perspective is not so much to provide a condensed history of South African media, as it is to explore the relationship between South Africa's turbulent socio-political landscape and its visual culture. In particular, we aim to explore the notion of collective identities as they manifested and still manifest in visual culture. We are interested in how South African visualities and identities borrow from and influence those from the Global North. We compare art, magazines and films from Africa with those from dominant, western cultures in an effort to understand the political power of visual, cultural and textual entanglement.

Social Justice in the Global Classroom

Field of Study Political Science

**Course
Description**

This interactive experiential learning module will equip participants to critically reflect and evaluate their contextual worldview around contemporary global social justice issues. We will journey to deepen our understanding of how to achieve equality in an unequal society by exploring modern racism, privilege, discrimination, oppression and structural injustice.

Violent Histories and Repair

Field of Study Interdisciplinary

**Course
Description**

Violent Histories and Repair is a multidisciplinary course that seeks to engage decolonial critical approaches to the study of the legacies of violent histories. We will take an intersectional approach and examine the structural aspects of systemic violence, including its racial and gendered dimensions, as well as the more insidious and symbolic forms of its expression that are embedded in institutional cultures and practices.

Understanding HIV in South Africa

Field of Study HIV/AIDS Management

**Course
Description**

This interactive course aims to develop a global understanding of HIV and AIDS, gender and sexuality through a health and social justice perspective. We will have a specific focus on the South African experience, evaluating how far we have come regarding HIV and Aids, gender, sexuality and health social justice in post-apartheid South Africa.

Global Health Systems and Equity

Field of Study Medicine and Health Sciences

Course Description This course offers an exploration of how evidence can drive equitable health systems. It combines theory, systems analysis, field engagement and participatory design in engaging with Stellenbosch University's Division of Health Systems and Public Health's core research areas: non-communicable diseases, health systems, health economics, quality improvement and community-engaged research through interactive sessions, simulations, field experiences and innovation labs. This course integrates analytical learning and creative problem solving approaches to translate research into meaningful impact.

Course 8

Transitional Justice

Field of Study Political Science

**Course
Description**

Among the pressing challenges facing societies emerging out of war or authoritarianism is how to respond to human rights violations perpetrated in the mayhem of conflict. South Africa's Truth and Reconciliation Commission represents one model that has been both celebrated and heavily critiqued. Offered by a practitioner who has worked with the UN in the African Great Lakes region, Nepal, and north Africa, this course sets the commission in historic and comparative context, critically highlighting questions about truth recovery, justice, reparations, and enabling non-recurrence.

Course 9

China in Africa

Field of Study International Relations and Chinese Studies

Course Description

This course offers a comprehensive introduction to China's engagement on the African continent. The course includes an overview of Chinese investments on the continent, including infrastructure, extractive industries and trade relationships; it also examines China-Africa relations within the context of global groupings such as BRICS and FOCAC, the role of historical and political relations and the growing role of Chinese security within Africa. The course familiarizes students with the controversy surrounding the relationship, including issues of labour and environmental degradation as well as mechanisms which African countries draw on to command more co-operative interaction.

Field of Study Art & Media

Description**

Course Description: The aim of the course is to teach students about photography with a focus on travel photography theory. Students will gain knowledge of their own cameras, improve their photography skills and gain practical experience in the areas of landscape and portrait photography as well as wildlife photography

Course 11 Global Surgery

Field of Study Medicine and health Sciences

**Course
Description**

The Global Surgery course aims to provide an introductory yet immersive experience for students interested in global surgery. The course explores key challenges, innovations, and ethical considerations in surgical care, with a specific focus on low- and middle-income countries (LMICs). The course is structured over five days, each focusing on a critical aspect of global surgery, combining lectures, hands-on activities, and field visits to create an engaging learning experience.

Specialised Programmes

19 June – 14 July 2026

Doing Business in Southern Africa (DBSA) Programme

Course Description

The course will give students an acute knowledge of the development challenges facing Southern African countries and understand the growth of emerging Southern African markets and identify future growth potential. Students will have the ability to discuss and debate current and future policy issues in a developing country context. Furthermore, they will get awareness of the additional social, environmental and ethical considerations for African businesses.

Course Description The course has theoretical and practical components aimed at enabling social impact and transformation. It is a collaborative venture with local schools and non-profit organisations, located in historically disadvantaged communities and it provides a valuable means of promoting internationalisation.

1. Official Academic Transcript
2. Copy of the Identification Pages of Your Passport
3. Proof of Medical Insurance; must include the following: *
 - Details of Membership (independent member or dependent on parents / guardian)
 - Declaration that the cover will be valid for the period spent outside home country
 - Short summary of medical cover provided*ONLY NEED TO PROVIDE AFTER YOU HAVE BEEN ACCEPTED TO THE SUMMER SCHOOL.
4. Although not required, travel and personal insurance is recommended.

STEP 3

Wait for feedback; feedback is normally given within 10 working days, upon which the student will be informed if they have been accepted.

AFTER APPLICATION

1. An invoice will be issued to the student with payment instructions;
2. After payment of the indicated summer school fees in full, a (LOA) Letter of Admission will be issued.
3. Pre- Course Information will be provided.

Academic Policies

Examinations:

Students will be evaluated during and at the end of each course. The format of the examination will be determined by the academic coordinator. Please refer to the course descriptions for more information.

Transferable Academic Credit:

The programme allows students to earn academic credits that may be transferred to their home university. After successful completion (100% class attendance) of the respective academic programme and a pass mark of at least 50% for all tests, assignments and essays, Stellenbosch University will issue an academic transcript and send it directly to the students' home university or service provider.

Grades & Transcripts:

Transcripts will be issued within 4 – 6 weeks after the end of the summer school. The transcripts will be issued with a transcript supplement / key which will assist with the conversion of South African credits.

Academic Integrity and Plagiarism:

Please see the Stellenbosch University Yearbook for more information regarding plagiarism and

Stellenbosch University's policies in this regard. It will be expected from students to fully comply with the rules and regulations regarding plagiarism. Students will also be required to comply with the Academic Guideline for the Summer school. The latter document will be made available on SUNLearn.

Virtual Learning Environment & Course Management System:

Students will make use of the SUNLearn (the official University Learning Management System) platform. SUNLearn orientation will be given to students on arrival. Various study materials will be made available before the start of the summer school via Moodle-based platform.



Evening and Social Programme

The academic programme is supported by a well-developed social programme consisting of day and weekend excursions to places of historical and touristic importance.

Places that will be visited and are included in the programme fee are: Robben Island, Table Mountain, Cape Point & Boulders Beach as well as a Weekend away. (For the General Elective Programme these trips are dependent on the Elective you choose)

The summer school evening programme includes: film screenings, traditional South African barbecues "Braai", karaoke, quiz night, dinner parties and many more. These are optional events activities

Those who would like to see a bit more of South Africa can join the optional Garden Route Tour at the end of the summer school.

Housing

Students are housed in a centrally located student dormitory on the Stellenbosch University campus. The student residence is determined closer to the start of the programme.

What to expect:

- The residence is situated on

campus and is a 5-10 minutes walk from the lecture halls.

- Access controlled entrance
- Double room
- Bedding is provided
- Towel is provided
- Your own study desk and lamp
- Separate male and female bathrooms
- Wifi access
- No central heating, but heaters are provided
- Cafeteria which provides breakfast and lunch
- Cooking facilities are not provided
- Recreational facilities
